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A. Background:



Dear fellow Rotarians, Rotaractors, Interactors and Friends of Rotary,

Peace has always been a top priority of Rotary since it was founded in 1905.

Rotary's commitment to building the conditions for sustainable peace meets the pillars of "the positive peace" defined as the attitudes, institutions and structures that create and sustain peaceful societies.

Through our service projects, peace fellowships, and scholarships, Rotarians are taking action to address the underlying causes of conflict, including poverty, inequality, ethnic tension, lack of access to education, and unequal distribution of resources...

- *Seek out schools who want to implement this pilot project and sign a MOU by providing ideas on how to set effective goals and effective strategies for meeting them.*
- *Provide materials and support explaining the Rotary core values and the four-way test, including the Object of Rotary and the club community service or Civic Education for Peacebuilding projects. We cannot expect schools to deliver high-quality results without informing them about us - the club/the Rotary - and making them understand our motto “service above self”.*
- *Develop and implement projects or events that support the five core values and the 4-way test.*

At the end, special thanks for the District Area of Focus Committee Chair Dr. Ghada Ayoub and all the members of the committee for the time and efforts to make this pilot project see the light.

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DAOF RY 2018-2019 : "CIVIC EDUCATION For PEACEBUILDING"

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B. Description:

The purpose of this guidebook is to serve as a resource for Rotary Clubs' presidents, the Rotary clubs and their partners who want to put this pilot project in place. This guidebook provides guidelines and a roadmap. It also carries practical suggestions as how to implement this pilot project in schools and classrooms, and how to apply for the grants and the awards.

C. Objectives:

Our objectives are:

- 1- **Helping schools in funding Civic Education for Peacebuilding activities.**
- 2- **Participating in activities related to Civic Education for Peacebuilding.**
- 3- **Promoting the Rotary core values, the 4-Way Test and the Object of Rotary.**

D. Guiding principles:

For more than 100 years, our guiding principles have been the foundation upon which our values and tradition stand. The Four-Way Test, Object of Rotary, and the Avenues of Service express our commitment to **service, fellowship, diversity, integrity, and leadership**. These principles have been developed over the years to provide Rotarians with a strong, common purpose and direction. They serve as a foundation for our relationships with each other and the achievements we do in the world.

1- Object of Rotary

The Object of Rotary is to encourage and foster the ideal of service as a basis of worthy enterprise and, in particular, to encourage and foster:

FIRST: The development of acquaintance as an opportunity for service;

SECOND: High ethical standards in business and professions; the recognition of the worthiness of all useful occupations; and the dignifying of each Rotarian's occupation as an opportunity to serve society;

THIRD: The application of the ideal of service in each Rotarian's personal, business, and community life;

FOURTH: The advancement of international understanding, goodwill, and peace through a world fellowship of business and professional persons united in the ideal of service.

2- Avenues of Service

We channel our commitment to service at home and abroad through five Avenues of Service, which are the foundation of club activity.

- Club Service focuses on making clubs strong. A thriving club is anchored by strong relationships and an active membership development plan.
- Vocational Service calls on every Rotarian to work with integrity and contribute their expertise to the problems and needs of society.

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- Community Service encourages every Rotarian to find ways to improve the quality of life for people in their communities and to serve the public interest.
- International Service exemplifies our global reach in promoting peace and understanding. We support this service avenue by sponsoring or volunteering on international projects, seeking partners abroad, and more.
- Youth Service recognizes the importance of empowering youth and young professionals through leadership development programs such as Rotaract, Interact, Rotary Youth Leadership Awards, and Rotary Youth Exchange.

3- Rotarian Code of Conduct

The Rotarian Code of Conduct provides a framework for ethical behavior that all Rotarians can use, together with The **Four-Way** Test, in their business and professional activities.

As a **Rotarian**, I will:

1. Act with integrity and high ethical standards in my personal and professional life.
2. Deal fairly with others and treat them and their occupations with respect.
3. Use my professional skills through Rotary to mentor young people, help those with special needs, and improve people's quality of life in my community and in the world.
4. Avoid behavior that reflects adversely on Rotary or other Rotarians.

4- The Rotary Four-Way Test

The Four-Way Test is a nonpartisan and nonsectarian ethical guide for Rotarians to use for their personal and professional relationships. The test has been translated into more than 100 languages, and Rotarians recite it at club meetings.

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E. Roadmap:

HOW to implement your ROTARY CLUB OR GROUP OF CLUBS' project DAOF*?

- 1- Find the school and get the approval of your club by signing a Club-school MOU. [**September - October 2018**]
- 2- Go into the school or college, ask the set group of students what is diversity, leadership, integrity, Service and fellowship and Keep answers as reference.
- 3- Train Educators.
- 4- Engage the set group of students in specific exercises/activity to explain more each core value, and make them use the four-way test. [**November 2018- December 2018**]
- 5- You may choose one or more of the Rotary core values, and implement a project with the school for students by defining what the main objectives of the project are, and upon its implementation who will benefit from it? [**December 2018- February 2019**].
- 6- At the end ask the same set of students what do they now know about the core values (same questionnaire as in 2 above) [**March 2019**]
- 7- Evaluate how much we succeeded (compare answers in 2. With 6) [**March 2019**]
- 8- Apply for the DAOF Award. [**March 2019**]
- 9- The winner of the first prize project will have the opportunity to invite the awarded project School principle/teacher/students [**April 2019**] to the 6th District Conference [**1-4 May 2019**] to share their success story. All projects will receive a certificate/award for their participations.

F. Financing:

The Rotary Foundation offers grants that support humanitarian projects, scholarships, and vocational training teams.

- **Global grants** support large international projects with long-term, sustainable outcomes in one or more of Rotary's areas of focus. They typically range from \$30,000 to \$200,000.
- **District grants** fund smaller scale, short-term projects that address immediate needs in your community or abroad.
- Clubs can leverage Rotary Foundation grants with DDF and SHARE funds to maximize projects' impact. To learn more, talk to your district Rotary Foundation committee chair or your Rotary Foundation Country Chair visit rotary.org/grant to apply for Global Grants.

1- When to apply?

Apply for District Grants within District deadline, **on basis first come, first served**: [September 15th, 2018 till November 15th, 2018]
 Apply for Global Grants by visiting rotary.org/grants

Your club may fund the project by itself. You will need the approval of your club assembly.

2- Funding:

Funding is within the DDF (District Grants and Global Grants),
 Funding may be within your club budget.

3- Steps for a Rotary Club or a group of Rotary Clubs:

- a- Is it a project for One Club or for a Group of RCs?
- b- Get your club approval.
- c- Make a community assessment, [mandatory]
- d- Find the school and get the approval by signing a Club-school MOU [mandatory]
- e- Apply for a DGrant or a GGrant and get District officers' approval [mandatory]
- f- Implement the project, take photos - videos with students/teachers/school flash interviews (prepare a storytelling in the project)
- g- Evaluation and final report
- h- Apply for the District award
- i- Invite School principle-teachers-students' representative of the **project awarded first prize** to attend the DAOF panel at the 6th District Conference in Beirut 1-4 May 2019.

4- District Grant or Global Grant and District 2452 officers

- a- District Governor: Michel Jazzar [approval for D. Grants] [approval if a GG needs financial contribution from DDF]
- b- District Rotary Foundation Committee Chair (DRFC): PDG Jamil Mouawad [approval for G. Grants]
- c- District Grant Chair: DG Michel Jazzar and PDG Farid Gebran [approval for D. Grants]

The Rotary and Rotaract Clubs of each country in the District 2452 are invited to organize alone or by group of clubs, a dictation in the theme of Civic Education for Peacebuilding to which an average of one hundred people should participate.

- **To sponsor a newspaper or magazine about Civic Education For Peacebuilding** per ex:

Help inspire the next generation of youth leaders by sponsoring the newspaper or magazine. You will celebrate excellent youth writing in an event where Awards for the *Rising Voices* are presented with each new issue of a citywide teen newspaper published quarterly... Three students receive a \$100 cash prize along with a framed copy of their award-winning article.

- **To organize a Dance Marathon** with passionate, motivated and responsible student leaders who work year-round to carry out Dance Marathon’s mission. (This year to support cases under the theme of Civic Education For Peacebuilding)

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- **To sponsor or organize a school or inter-school Marathon:** 7k fun run or woman's fun run to create mass awareness on the theme of Civic Education for Peacebuilding.
- **To organize a Rally paper** (Q&A about values), **cycle rally paper** (Q&A about the theme of Civic Education for Peacebuilding)
- **To sponsor a team of sports players at school per ex:**
to support a Wheelchair Fencing Team, or to sponsor future sports stars, at a cost of \$--- per child, which covers the coaching fees and the uniform cost, and through the playing of the sport teaches the children teamwork, social skills, commitment and a host of other skills that will take them far beyond the soccer pitch or ...
Provide the team by a branded t-shirt for the “Civic Education For Peacebuilding” with the Rotary Wheel's logo.
- **To create** School / community awareness campaign about one or more core values.
